



AMP*D is an intermediate youth group hosted after school every second Friday, primarily attended by youth from local primary schools in Central Hawkes Bay. This year, AMP*D has seen an exciting turnout as we continuously invite and welcome new youth to join us for our fun nights at Epic. The variety of planned activities ranges from indoor games and sports to photo challenges and wide man hunts in town. The youth enjoy all of these activities, and we receive positive feedback not only from the kids but also from their parents. As a result, AMP*D has developed a strong reputation in the community, and we plan to continue building upon it.

The leadership team for our AMP*D nights primarily consists of students from Central Hawkes Bay College. They provide invaluable assistance in organizing and facilitating our planned activities. Throughout the year, our leadership team continued to grow, positively impacting AMP*D by bringing fresh ideas, enthusiasm, and support to our events. Their involvement has been crucial in creating a welcoming and engaging atmosphere for all participants. By the end of the year, we had around 20 leaders, including some fantastic Epic staff members, actively helping with our youth nights.

Our first AMP*D nights during Term 1 aimed to introduce new youth and welcome back those who had already been involved. Throughout the term, we saw a gradual increase in participation, with more kids joining in the fun during our AMP*D nights.

Terms 2 and 3 for AMP*D were filled with engaging activities that were not only fun but also helped strengthen our community. Highlights included our Neon Disco, which invited all youth from local primary schools, creating a vibrant night of dancing and enjoyment. With the Olympics happening, it was fitting to host an Olympics-Themed Night, encouraging teamwork through friendly competition while having loads of fun. We also organized a Newspaper Night, allowing youth to express their creativity by quickly answering questions and collaborating on articles, promoting teamwork and critical thinking. Additionally, our Hall/Sport Games provided fantastic opportunities to bond through physical activity. Overall, these events fostered an inclusive environment, and we received very positive feedback for all activities throughout both terms.

Term 4 for AMP*D was a fantastic conclusion to the year, filled with exciting activities that brought everyone together. We kicked off with Hall Games, fostering friendly competition and teamwork among youth. The Wide Game Photo Challenge added an adventurous twist, encouraging youth to explore and capture fun moments while working in teams. Our Ice Cream Olympics was a sweet highlight, combining delicious treats with friendly rivalry in a series of fun challenges. Finally, we wrapped up the year with a Water-Themed Night, featuring games and activities that embraced the summer spirit.

AMP*D has been an absolute blast in 2024, and while we're sad to see it come to an end along with our Year 8 youth leaving for high school, we're excited for the new chapter of fun and memorable moments that 2025 will bring. We

The Hauora program is an in-school teaching experience for our intermediate students, focusing on well-being and the holistic model of Te Whare Tapa Whā. This program emphasizes the four cornerstones of well-being: taha tinana (physical), taha hinengaro (mental), taha whānau (family), and taha wairua (spiritual), helping students understand the importance of balance in their lives.

We began the program at local schools Terrace and Waipukurau Primary for the first two terms. As we reached the end of Term 2, we expanded to Pukehou and Otane Primary for another two terms. Each school participated in around nine sessions, with every session dedicated to discussing the idea of well-being and how to balance the body and mind with personal life challenges.

We were very fortunate to have help from two gateway students, Maia and Tiare, who attend Central Hawkes Bay College. They supported and facilitated some activities during Hauora and shared their past experiences related to the topics we discussed in our sessions. Their insights added depth to our conversations and made the sessions even more relatable for the students.

Additionally, the program included sessions on building healthy relationships, the importance of healthy diets and rest, understanding the significance of family support, which emphasizes the importance of connection and community. Creative activities like art and journaling allowed students to express their feelings and reflect on their personal journeys.

The feedback from students has been very positive. Many appreciated having a safe space to discuss challenges and learn coping strategies. At the end of session 9, students will also be able to keep work booklets for reference, allowing them to revisit discussions or situations that may arise in the future.

Overall, the Hauora program has successfully created an inclusive environment where students can thrive both personally and socially. By focusing on the principles of Te Whare Tapa Whā, we are fostering a culture of well-being that will benefit our students now and in the future. We look forward to continuing this journey and exploring even more ways to support our students' holistic health!





Travellers

Travellers is a program we run at CHB College Youth Hub, focusing on building resilience, connectedness, self-esteem, and self-confidence among Year 9 students. Throughout the program, we explored core themes including "Life is a Journey," "I'm Okay," "Express Yourself," "I Think Therefore I Am." In total, we facilitated six groups across terms 1, 2, and 3, with two groups each term. In term 4, we reconnected with 20 Travellers participants for a focused 4-week group that centred on creating dream boards. This year, we had over 60 Year 9 students complete the program. Approximately 40% of the participants transitioned into the LiFT and other Epic programs, highlighting the program's positive impact on their personal development.

During Explore, we enjoyed sitting outside to chat and do icebreakers. At times, we also met in the school whare to play Māori games and engage in journaling activities.

As we continue to refine and enhance the Explore program, we remain committed to fostering a supportive space where rangatahi can thrive and develop a stronger sense of self.

The Youth Council is composed of 10 dedicated students: Rita Simiona and Hannah Webster, who are the lead representatives, supported by Lucas Perceval, Olivia McDonald, Hamish Ganley, Hezekiah Schaumkel, Libby Burne, Isaac Ellwood, Jafet Monegro, and John Dalemar Mananes.

As the Youth Worker at Epic Ministries, I, Ariana-Jean, facilitate meetings with the Youth Council and collaborate closely with council representatives Rita Simiona and Hannah Webster. Our primary objective is to amplify youth voices and help realise their visions and ideas. We are committed to supporting and addressing issues or proposals from young people in our community while fostering a safe and inclusive environment through the Youth Hub. The past year has been both exciting and productive, building on our mission to empower young people and promote community engagement. This annual report highlights our key achievements, activities, and future goals.

Engagement with Local Leaders



Our termly meetings with Mayor Alex and Deputy Mayor Kelly Annand have been pivotal. These interactions have inspired us to



explore new ideas and concepts, providing valuable insights and strengthening our connection with the wider community. They serve as a reminder that we are the voices of our generation.

Youth Weeks and Lunchtime Activities

Youth Weeks have been a major highlight this year. With the absence of phones in schools, we observed increased engagement from young people in our activities. This term's theme was "He aha te mea nui te ao? He tangata he tangata, he tangata!" — "What is the most important thing in the world? It is people, it is people, it is people!" We designed activities to promote inclusivity, teamwork, and mutual support, reinforcing the importance of community and connection.

Reflecting on last year's report, we focused on addressing bullying within our community. Our promotion and execution of Pink Shirt Day played a crucial role in raising awareness and creating a culture of kindness and respect. During Pink Shirt Day, we conducted various interactive events, such as role-playing scenarios and kindness challenges, to help students practice and reinforce positive behaviours. The success of Pink Shirt Day has inspired ongoing anti-bullying initiatives, and we remain committed to addressing bullying through regular educational programs, workshops, and support services.

Community Impact and Future Goals

Throughout the year, our initiatives have positively impacted the community. By fostering a sense of belonging and encouraging active participation, we have contributed to a more engaged and connected youth community. Our activities have provided opportunities for personal growth, leadership development, and community service.

Breakfast Club

In addition to our other activities, the Youth Council successfully ran the Breakfast Club every second Thursday from 8:00 to 9:00 AM at the Youth Hub during Terms 2 and 3. This initiative









was aimed at providing a welcoming start to the day for students and fostering a sense of community.

Each session featured a variety of breakfast options, including:

Spaghetti Toasties A warm and hearty choice that was popular among attendees.

Pancakes perfect for a morning treat.

Porridge A wholesome option to start the day off right.

To complement these meals, we also served very sugary Milos, which were a hit with the students and added a touch of sweetness to their morning. The Breakfast Club not only provided nutritious food but also created a friendly and supportive environment for students to socialise and engage with each other. It served as a valuable platform for fostering connections and building a sense of belonging within our school community.

Festival For the Future

One of the most exciting opportunities this year was attending the Festival For the Future (FFTF) in Wellington. A group of 18 youth and 5 adults represented our Council over four days. Highlights of this experience included:

Mayor's Lunch - We were honoured to attend a special lunch with various Youth Councils from across the country, providing a platform for networking and idea-sharing.

Inspiring Speakers - The event featured numerous speakers who shared their stories and empowered us with their experiences. The talks were both motivational and educational, offering new perspectives on youth engagement and leadership.

Learning and Networking - The festival allowed us to learn, have fun, and make new friends and connections, enriching our experience and broadening our horizons.

During our time in Wellington for the Festival For the Future (FFTF), we took advantage of the opportunity to engage in various





team-building and recreational activities. These experiences not only enriched our trip but also strengthened our group dynamics and provided a fun break from the festival's schedule. Some of the highlights included:

We held a very competitive pizza-making competition with Mayor Alex as our judge

We participated in an exhilarating experience at Cyber Ninja Punk in Lower Hutt, which featured high ropes and a spongy obstacle course. A visit to Te Papa the national museum, provided us with an opportunity to explore New Zealand's rich cultural and natural history. 
MINISTRY OF YOUTH DEVELOPMENT 2024 PARTICIPANT FEEDBACK SURVEY

The graphs below give an overview of the responses of 233 youth participants in Epic programs and initiaives this year.


How happy were you with the staff/facilitators?



As we approach the last few weeks of 2024 I reflect on the ebb and flow of the needs of rangatahi in our community, and the effective and responsive youth work that is required to address them across a wide variety of circumstances. Epic has long been appreciated for its ability to pivot and respond and this year as always has seen several opportunities to continue doing this. I admire that our team is able to step in and advocate for, support and cheerlead for the youth, as well as have a lot of fun alongside them! We have an awesome team of enthusiastic and dedicated staff and volunteers who work with hundreds of youth across CHB, facilitating programs and activities in school, after school and on camps.

Here's a snapshot of our income streams this year:-

- \$33,000 A/P regular supporter donations
- \$31,000 Other one-off donations
- \$21,600 St Andrews Church support
- \$25,000 Pastoral care gifts

\$202,000 – MYD Contract (Admin/Facilitation/Program - mentoring)

\$79,250 - Grants (as below)


\$17,500 – Interest – on advance paid contract funding, and operational reserves on term deposits
